IFT President Responds to "Doomsday" Warning

G overnor Quinn's proposed "doomsday" would propel our state on a path to economic ruin. The 14,000 teacher layoffs that would be triggered in districts large and small would effectively destroy our system of public education, eliminating one of our state's best tools – a strong system of public education from pre-Kindergarten to graduate schools – for fueling an economic recovery.

This budget cannot be an option for our state, and the General Assembly must reject it out of hand.

The people of Illinois may not be happy with a modest tax increase, but they will be outraged with cuts that decimate education and public services.

Lawmakers must do the right thing and raise the revenue this state desperately needs.

Our peek into the crystal ball at Illinois' future with a doomsday budget in place is a future no Illinois citizen wants to see.

Court Rules Student Test Questions May Be Subject to Parent Review

The Illinois First District Court of Appeals has reversed a lower court decision in a case asking if test questions are subject to the Illinois School Student Records Act (ISSRA).

At issue are tests where questions are on the same paper as a student's name, calculations, and answers. The appellate court opinion is that the "overall scheme of (ISSRA) is to provide a broad right of access with narrow exceptions."

The broader implication of Garlick v. Oak Park and River Forest High School District #200 is that a student or parent may have a legal right to examine any test, quiz, homework item, or project which contains a student's name, markings, etc., as a student record under ISSRA.

Westmont Legislative Forum is Standing Room Only

eyden High School Council English teacher John Rossi, in response to Governor Quinn's proposal to require TRS members to pay an additional 2% pension contribution effectively imposing a statewide pay cut, was to the point. "Make no mistake. Our desire to serve does not equal a willingness to bear the full weight of our state's economic burden."

Rossi was one of four panel members to testify before a crowd of more than 500 Illinois Federation of Teachers (IFT) and American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) members at the West Suburban Forum on May 4, in Westmont. The Forum was organized to discuss the Illinois budget crisis and proposed changes to health care and pension cost and benefits for active and retired educators, university employees, and state employees.

Rossi continued, pointing out that, "The 9% contribution of teachers and university faculty and staff is (already) one of the highest employee contributions in the nation."

Cicero Council school psychologist Gary Tolman followed with additional facts, remarking, "The state cannot balance the budget on the backs of educators. We must insist that the state do the right thing and stop using our pensions to balance the (Illinois) budget."

Eight legislative forums conducted around the state by the IFT and AFSCME have provided an opportunity for members to inform their local legislators about our opposition to most of the governor's proposal. Many members came to the forums hoping to hear directly from their state representatives.

Unfortunately, few legislators attended. Of 30 local legislators invited to the West Suburban Forum, only Dennis Reboletti (R-46, Addison) was present to listen and respond to concerns. Paul Froehlich (D-56, Schaumburg) and Daniel Burke (D-23, Chicago) indicated that they would attend but were not present. Twelve representatives responded that they could not attend.

Three AFSCME members who testified implored everyone to contact each legislator who did not attend, as well as the governor, to answer our most pressing questions and respond to our issues. Several solutions to the state's problems were suggested. Among these were:

- Increase the personal income tax to 5%
- Increase the corporate income tax to 8%
- Carefully target tax credits to low-income and middle-class families
- Collect sales tax on services
- Increase user fees

As moderator, I reminded participants that, "A crisis is an opportunity. This is a time for bold leadership. We ask all of our legislators to help lead our state to fair solutions for a fair budget."

Keep up the pressure. The legislative session is due to end on May 31. Demand of your legislators that they raise enough revenues for a fair solution for a fair budget.

Note: As the *Union Messenger* goes to press, the governor has reversed his proposal for current teachers and state workers to pay an additional 2% of salaries into the pension system.

The current concerns are amendments to House Bill 2643 creating a two-tier pension plan for all public pension systems, along with funding and health insurance reductions placed before the Illinois House of Representatives by State Representative Don Harmon.

Judicious Review

This is the time of year when educators especially focus on review and wrap-up activities. Our ER&D classes refer to the kind of review enabling students to achieve lasting automatic mastery as "judicious review."

Judicious review is adequate, distributed, cumulative, and varied. Teachers intuitively know that adequate review varies for individual students and provide additional review for slower learners. Adequate review is most crucial for these low performers, who will not achieve long-term retention without it.

The issue of massed vs. distributed practice is one of the most well researched topics in education. Research has consistently found that practice should first be massed and later distributed, with gradually increased periods of non-review between practice activities. This is the best review schedule for assuring long-term retention.



"KNOWLEDGE IS POWER"

Cognitive scientist Daniel T. Willingham suggests practical ways to apply this research. This begins by determining the core content (what the students will need to know 20 years from now) and identifying this core as the key facts and concepts for distributed study. Once identified, these core concepts should be presented in a distributed schedule throughout the course.

Homework assignments should also distribute practice by including material taught earlier in the year. Cramming for tests can be discouraged by eliciting review as part of routine class activities and also by including a question or two from previous units on each test. This encourages students to continue paying attention to the core content.

These core big ideas should also be broken down into smaller pieces so that they can be more easily practiced

during routine "down times" and transitions throughout the day.

Students should be let in on the "secret" that an important part of learning is remembering, that they are more likely to remember if they review material repeatedly, and that they can spend less total time studying if they distribute their study over several sessions.


Cumulative review can help eliminate confusion. Similar but different facts, concepts, and strategies often confuse students. An example is that the addition and multiplication


of fractions are processes that often appear similar to students, but are quite different. After both processes have been taught and mastered it is important to review them cumulatively within the same review session. This is also necessary because real world mathematics is mixed and cumulative.

Students need to be able to transfer learning into varied situations, and instruction is frequently criticized as not enabling students to do this. One way to work toward learning transfer is to make instruction as authentic as possible, and to then vary the reviews. Varying the practice contexts leads to better generalization.


Our *Instructional Strategies* course teaches an effective practice technique called Classwide Peer Tutoring (CWPT). CWPT was developed to increase academic engagement for Title 1 students. It is a highly structured activity that increases academic learning time and is especially effective for at-risk learners. Many studies have independently found this technique to be extremely effective.

We can use all of these techniques to help our students become experts by the end of a school year.

Cicero Council Members Attend Baltimore PSRP Conference

The 32nd annual AFT PSRP Professional Issues Conference was held this year in Baltimore, Maryland, over the March 20-22 weekend. Attending from Local 571 were Cicero Council members Maria Rivera and Olga Vazquez.

Among the presentations attended were sessions on the effect of child nutrition in the classroom, strategies for boosting student achievement, and how to create positive learning environments.

Rivera, an LD program assistant, was impressed by a session which focused on supporting children with medically fragile needs. "I realized how important it is for supervising adults to be informed about health and safety standards (that) apply to these students."

Vazquez, who works at Goodwin Elementary School in Cicero, found the importance of effective communication skills to be a common emphasis of several presenters.

Green Schools Initiative Earth Day Presentation

The April 20 House of Representatives presentation noted that the AFT is among the campaign's founding organizations and that Illinois was the second state to require green cleaning. The Employee Free Choice Act, Revisited

Por members questioning the need for the Employee Free Choice Act, a new study by Cornell University professor Kate Bronfenbrenner provides a sobering and persuasive response. Her research shows that not only do some employers engage in punitive campaigns of intimidation, but tactics are getting worse.

In *No Holds Barred: The Intensification of Employer Opposition to Organizing*, Bronfenbrenner provides a comprehensive, independent analysis of employer behavior in union elections supervised by the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) between 1999 and 2003.

According to the report, it is standard practice in NLRB election campaigns for workers to be subjected by to threats, interrogation, harassment, surveillance and retaliation for union activity. Inside AFT

Local 571 Scholarships Announced

Elmhurst College student **Katie Gilman**, daughter of Franklin Park Custodians Council member Mark Gilman will receive the 2009 **Jo Ann Horowitz Scholarship**.

Jo Ann Horowitz taught at Morton High School and was a vital force in Local 571, the IFT, and the AFT. Through Jo Ann's advocacy, equal pay for female extracurricular advisors, equal access to extra-pay jobs including summer school, and a greater awareness that women should not be discriminated against was achieved.

Jo Ann fought for teacher dignity and the best education for all students. This \$1,000 West Suburban Teachers Union scholarship is awarded annually to a current undergraduate sophomore or junior college/university student pursuing a teaching or women's studies career. Eligible recipients include active Local 571 members, or the child or grandchild of a member in good standing.

The **Mary Wheeler Scholarship** award honors Mary Wheeler, a Proviso High School teacher from 1924 to 1965. Wheeler was a highly respected educator who served many years as West Suburban Teachers Union president, as well as an IFT president and an AFT vice president. Mary was a founding member of the Proviso Council of Teachers (1938-1939) and helped organize several west suburban councils.
