Reflecting On Never Forgetting By Jane Russell, 571 Retiree

Some events are so etched into our memories that we know exactly where we were when the event occurred. I was in high school freshmen study hall (actually physically distanced at tables in the cafeteria) when the principal came on the loudspeaker to announce that President John F. Kennedy had been shot and killed by a sniper. It was a sad and indelible moment in my mind.

Fast forward a few years, when I had just finished teaching my first hour physical science class and was heading down the back staircase to the science office. A physical education teacher came out of the gymnasium next door to my classroom and said, "Did you hear one of the twin towers of the World Trade Center (WTC) in New York City had been hit by an airplane?" I did not believe him at first as this event seemed too implausible. I rushed down the stairs to the office to watch and hear that the tower was hit by a hijacked passenger jet. It was even more horrific when I watched the second tower hit by another hijacked airline flight. And not long thereafter, the WTC collapsed into a mountain of rubble, smoke and debris entombing the workers and first responders caught inside.

As I watched the events unfolding in New York, another hijacked airplane circled over downtown Washington, D.C., before crashing into the west side of the Pentagon, the headquarters of the U.S. Department of Defense. Jet fuel from the Boeing 757 caused a devastating inferno that led to the structural collapse of a portion of the giant concrete building. I was especially anxious and immediately called a retired science teacher colleague whose daughter worked for the Joint Chiefs of Staff at the Pentagon. Jody was there that day, was not hurt, but ended up having to walk miles to her Virginia home because the Washington D.C. transit system shut down following the attack.

It is now the 20th anniversary of 9/11. I was able to view an advanced showing of the documentary, September 11, 2001: The Day That Changed the World. How do we explain 9/11 to students who have no memory of this event? The free program on the anniversary of the event has a 2-fold theme of commemoration and what we learned as well as striving for social justice. The Islamic terror organization, Al-Qaeda, eventually claimed responsibility for the attacks. For me, to watch the documentary showing survivors that were there and sharing their stories, was very difficult. If you remember 9/11 and will show the documentary in your classes, bring some tissues. One of the speakers suggests we all will take something different away from the events of that day.

Another speaker went on to say that the nearly 3,000 death certificates of those who perished were labeled "homicide", not an "accident." Fittingly, a guide on how to talk to your students about terrorism is also available.

Where the twin towers of the World Trade Center were located has been replaced by an exceptional museum and memorial, near Ground Zero, with a plaza, pools and exhibits honoring victims of the 1993 and the 2001 WTC terrorist attacks. The 20th anniversary event will honor the legacy of those who lost their lives and provide an opportunity for their stories to be told.

We must never forget.

Why is the Illinois Federation of Teachers engaging in antiracist work?

THE SHORT ANSWER: WE MUST.

IT IS OUR DUTY AS A UNION. We cannot fight economic injustice without fighting racial injustice. It is a part of who we are as an organization. In Article II of our Constitution, one of our listed objectives is, "to expose and fight all forms of racism, discrimination, and promote policies, programs and trainings that enhance participation in the union by underrepresented minorities." In 2019, we passed a resolution to encourage our members to participate in learning opportunities on implicit bias, restorative justice, and equity, and to commit our organization to fighting for the measures that would mitigate the impacts of trauma on our students and communities. We passed a resolution committing our union to participate in the Black Lives Matter at School movement as well.

IT IS IMPERATIVE TO US WINNING. Race baiting has always been used as a strategy to divide workers and push anti-labor, corporate interests. Racial solidarity is our strategy to build power and dismantle oppressive systems that exploit working people.

IT IS THE MORAL THING TO DO. If we tolerate injustice anywhere, it undermines our credibility. When we commit to being antiracist, we are helping to create a world where we can all live fully in our humanity.

We live in a nation that was built on land and wage theft, broken treaties, slavery and Jim Crow, xenophobia, and the exploitation of the most marginalized. Inequity has been woven into the fabric of our institutions and systems. Whether you live on the South Side of Chicago or in Southern Illinois, these racist structures are present every day. We must come to terms with our history so that we understand how it is reinforced in the present, impacting our work, our communities, our students, and ourselves. We must reflect, learn, and then act so that we can build a better future.

IFT staff, board members, and locals across the state have already begun taking on this work. We hope this guide helps even more commit to antiracism as a part of our personal and work lives.

We must do this together to achieve the future we all deserve.

Illinois Federation of Teachers (IFT) Local 571 Convention Delegates Election

Nominations are now being accepted for delegates to the Illinois Federation of Teachers Convention that will convene in St. Louis, MO on October 21-23, 2022. All Local 571 members are eligible to be nominated as delegates to this convention. Including the ten (10) Officers and Area Trustees of Local 571 who became delegates by virtue of being elected to office, the number of delegates to be elected to this convention will be up to fifty-five (55). Ballots will be counted, and candidates will be ranked by the number of ballots received. Allowing for the ten (10) Officers and Area Trustees, the forty-five (45) candidates with the most votes will be declared delegates. The remaining candidates will be declared alternate delegates; and should any delegate(s) notify the Local of an inability to fulfill the duties of delegate, these alternate delegates will be selected in rank order of votes received to serve in place of the delegate who is unable to serve. Delegates who attend the convention will be reimbursed for expenses up to \$680/delegate. Nominations must be printed or typed (name and Council) and received in the Local 571 office on or before March 14, 2022. Nominees will receive a written or electronic acknowledgement of receipt. Voting will take place in May 2022 via secret ballot. Council leaders will notify members of the date(s) that voting will take place. Retirees' ballots will be mailed to 571 retiree members via U.S. Postal Service.

American Federation of Teachers (AFT) Convention Delegates

Nominations are now being accepted for delegates to the American Federation of Teachers Convention that will convene in Boston, MA, on July 14-17, 2022. All Local 571 members are eligible to be nominated as delegates to this convention. There can be up to forty- Local 571 Council Presidents who serve as seven (47) delegates, including the ten (10) Officers which include Area Trustees, who became delegates by virtue of being elected to office. Ballots will be counted, and candidates will be ranked by the number of ballots received. Allowing for the ten (10) Officers, the thirty-seven (37) candidates with the most votes will be declared delegates. The remaining candidates will be declared alternate delegates; and should any delegate(s) notify the Local of an inability to fulfill the duties of delegate, these alternate delegates will be selected in rank order of votes received to serve in place of the delegate who is unable to serve. Delegates who attend the convention will be reimbursed for expenses up to \$1,442/delegate. Nominations must be printed or typed (name and Council) and received in the Local 571 office on or before February 7, 2022. Nominees will receive a written or electronic acknowledgement of receipt. Voting will take place in April 2022 via secret ballot. Council leaders will notify members of the date(s) that voting will take place. Retired members' ballots will be mailed via U.S. Postal Service to their homes.

Local 571 Executive Board Area Trustees

Nominations are now being accepted for Local 571 Executive Board Area Trustees. The Executive Board of Local 571 shall consist of the Officers of Local 571 which include four (4) Area Trustees, at least one of whom is a PSRP member, and the Trustees. All Local 571 members are eligible to be nominated as Local 571 Area Trustees. The term of office is two (2) years beginning July 1, 2022, and by virtue of their election, they shall be elected also as delegates to the AFT and IFT Conventions. Nominations must be printed or typed (name and Council) and received in the Local 571 office on or before March 14, 2022. Nominees will receive a written or electronic acknowledgement of receipt. Voting will take place in May 2022 via secret ballot. Council leaders will notify members of the date(s) that voting will take place. Interested individuals may request further information about the duties of the office by contacting Local 571. Retired members' ballots will be mailed via U.S. Postal Service to their homes.


