# Igniting Member Engagement

You are a Union member, as am I. How can we endure in these troubled times when the governor of Illinois, as well as many others with deep purses, are trying to reduce and diminish our strength? Simple, just light the flame and do your part to be engaged.

Being engaged in our Union means there are many opportunities for which you and your Union sisters and brothers can take advantage, both to become a stronger Union member as well as building your Council. Most of these opportunities require a small amount of your time. Consider the following:

- (1) Participate in your Council—Attend meetings and/or social events, participate on a Union committee or be a Union mentor to a new hire.
- **(2) Run for office**—either as a council officer or building representative, on your local school board or city council. This opportunity is challenging, and there is a definite time commitment. The IFT can offer training on how to be a successful candidate. However, you can provide your perspective, especially about being a Union worker.
- (3) Be politically active—Call or e-mail your Illinois Senator or Representative often. There is much at stake without a State budget at this time for which you have valuable insight because you see and work with kids and their families every day that are being hurt by the lack of funding. Calling or e-mailing takes only a few minutes of time. For those more interested in having a longer conversation, call the local legislative office and make an appointment to talk with your Senator or Representative. Generally the legislators are welcoming and are equally interested in what you have to say. Ask a few of your colleagues to join you. We understand the issues and can talk from first-hand experience.
- **(4) Be a convention delegate**—There are three Union conventions in 2016 for which you can add your name as a nominee. In March, Local 571 will have its convention in Westmont. In July, the AFT convention will be held in Minneapolis, Minnesota, and in October, the IFT will hold its triennial convention in St. Louis, Missouri. You will come away with a better appreciation of our Union, locally, statewide and nationally.
- (5) Join a campaign--for local legislators and/or Congress people running for office in 2016. The time devoted could be as little as an hour in a month. You can make some phone calls, help with a mailer, have a coffee at your home, or walk the precincts on a beautiful fall day to gather signatures on petitions. It's fun to walk with a partner or friend and you meet nice people in your local area.

# The 2015 PDK/Gallup Poll Report on Attitudes Toward Public Schools by Bonnie Saracco

Last May the PDK/Gallup Poll surveyed a representative sample of Americans over age 18, receiving replies from 3,499 people online and 1,001 by phone. The phone survey included questions which have been tracked for many years, while the web survey included new topics of interest. The web survey also allowed the data to be disaggregated by ethnic group and political affiliation, and found that these groups agree more than they disagree.

Americans, especially public school parents, are closely following the debate about education and have reached strong, nuanced conclusions. The poll shows a real disconnect between what we want for our schools and what the "reformers" are giving us. AFT President Randi Weingarten summed it up, "In no uncertain terms, the public is saying end the fixation on and misuse of testing. Americans are fed up with the overemphasis and high-stakes consequences of standardized tests."

We still want high standards and accountability, but believe that grades, examples of student work,



graduation rates, and observations written by teachers are better indicators of progress than are standardized test scores. The majority of the public opposes the use of standardized test scores in teacher evaluations. But there is still a split on whether parents should have the right to excuse their children from taking standardized tests, and most public school parents would not do so. Whether this is due to perceived negative consequences for the child was not determined.

High-stakes testing has also damaged support for the Common Core State Standards. Despite the great potential of a system of rigorous, organized, world-class standards, the CCSS are now tied in the public's mind to the punitive consequences of unfair tests. And although the CCSS is an initiative by the states, they are seen as a

federal program. This is unfortunate because only 20% of Americans want the federal government to hold schools accountable or to decide the amount of testing in schools.

Austerity and inequity are seen as the biggest problems facing our schools. The conviction that there is not enough financial support for schools has had staying power. For the tenth year in a row, the public has said that we need to make a larger investment in our schools and give students the resources they need to be successful. Every ethnic group agrees that less than half of public school students are getting a high-quality education. Weingarten summed this up also, 'Parents and the public get that what's needed for kids to have a great education: less testing, more funding, strong curriculum, good teaching in small class sizes."



#### **Igniting Member Engagement (cont.d)**

- (6) Attend a Local 571 professional development training—We offer excellent classes and workshops now almost monthly, one to two evenings per class, most for PD hours and often graduate or undergraduate credit. These classes or workshops are either no cost to members or at minimal cost. And yes, we always have meals or refreshments! This is a great way to work on licensure renewal, get up-to-date information and share with other local members who are also interested in helping our students to gain success in their schooling. You can also request a course or class be taught and we will locate the instructors so the information delivered will be both helpful and worthwhile to enhance your job skills. For example, a group of Local 571 support staff requested additional training about working with medically fragile children in their district. The AFT instructor is a PSRP himself and has been involved in this critical area of education for many years. Watch for our workshop offerings, either in the *Union Messenger* or through your council officers disseminating that information
- (7) **Host a community event** —which can have a significant effect with the parents and families, community members and businesses by participating with your district students, staff and administration. In the last couple of years, council members have marched in local parades, helped build a garden, collected food and/or clothing, donated to the local food pantry, held a Do-It-Yourself Event, provided books for their students through First Book, handed out school supplies or back packs in the fall and the list goes on. The experience is often fun and rewarding, and you can see both immediate and long term results with community work.
- **(8) Join us socially**—This is the 10<sup>th</sup> year of the annual Local 571 Legislative Breakfast which is being held on November 7, 2015, in Oak Brook. This event is always free to members. (See the list of invited legislators in the article below.) Legislators will serve on one of two panels and asked the difficult questions for which we all want answers.

We hope to see each of you take advantage of an opportunity to strengthen OUR UNION. Be engaged. Join us wherever and whenever you can.

## The Language Police by Diane Ravitch

Have you ever seen a student pick up a basal reader to read just for fun? Neither have I. Other than as picture books, why are so many of these mind-numbingly dull?

Diane Ravitch answers this question in *The Language Police: How Pressure Groups Restrict What Students Learn*. Ravitch is a top education historian, Brookings Institution Nonresident Senior Fellow, and was Assistant Secretary of Education for George H.W. Bush. She has made numerous presentations at AFT conferences and conventions, and has authored eleven books.

Ravitch explains that publishers self-censor because textbooks must be adopted by big states to be most profitable. With Texas on the right, and California on the left, there is a long list of topics, words, and phrases that must be avoided. Excerpts from longer texts must also be scrubbed of them. Whole-grains breads are okay, sweet rolls are out. Landlord is sexist, owner is acceptable. Ravitch lists the forbidden material for 31 disturbingly hilarious pages.

My favorite part of the book is *The Atkinson-Ravitch Sampler of Classic Literature*, which suggests engaging classics that don't fit these guidelines. From *The Tale of Peter Rabbit* (Peter gets away with it) to *The Great Gatsby* (too much partying), these are worth teaching, unabridged.


